In my heart I really appreciated the child's honesty and his sensible behavior towards his family. I gave child comfort and assurance that now you should not worry about it and I'll handle this matter and I told him that I am proud of u that you are honest and you had guts to accept your mistake.

Here I was stuck in a moral dilemma

Whether should I save Raghav as he is innocent and solve this issue, simply by handing over the skateboard to Arnav.

Or should I tell my zone incharge about the entire scenario. Which might not go in favor of Raghav and this will inturn will only hamper Raghav's image in class in school and will lower his morale? I deeply thought about this matter that being a responsible teacher should I save Raghav or should I take side of Arnav, as both are correct on their part.

Sometimes this kind of difficult situation always arise in our lives may it be personal may it be professional for us sometimes which looks like a no.6 may seem like a no. 9 for others. Arnav was right on his part as he needed justice and Raghav was also not completely wrong. If I would stretch this matter to zone head or our principal, Raghav would lose trust on everyone including me. On the other hand Arnav and his parents wanted to know who took the skates.

I explained Raghav never ever use things that don't belong to you. Without the permission of the one who owns it. I chose to save Raghav and with my salary saving I gifted him new skate board. I m still in touch with this child and I feel proud when I got to know that this child has recently won skating contest on state level. I believe I was just a messenger sent from god to give this child wings to fly.

The moral of the story

We have solutions to all problems. No one is right or wrong it is different situations which make us do right or wrong things. Every step of life we are stuck in a moral dilemma between the rights and the wrongs, between truth and lies. It is in our hands what decisions we make in a life for us and for others. Teacher's job is not just teaching of completing the curriculum. Children's future is in our hands. And children are just like clay they become how we mould them. You make them or break them.
